

How to turn this in: **Submit this essay** (25% of course grade) on Moodle **by 5:00 p.m. Saturday, Mar. 9** (soft due date) or by **Mar. 16**, saved as a .docx or .pdf file. You are welcome to use the TurnItIn tool *before* the due date to check for accidental plagiarism.

Assignment information: **Two topic options are below.** The **goal** is to build a convincing argument using materials assigned or provided in our course. No additional research is needed.

The **end product** is an argumentative essay that directly responds to the assigned question. Support your position with well-explained evidence from course readings.

Technical requirements: Your essay must be **1500-2000 words, including citations**, which totals about 5-7 pages in Times New Roman 12-point font with one-inch margins. **Since you are using course texts, there is no need for a bibliography;** give abbreviated citations of sources in footnotes following this pattern:

<u>Examples of abbreviated sources in footnotes</u>	<u>What to include</u>
1. Ormand, <i>Controlling Desires</i> , pp. 279-280.	(author, book/chapter title, page numbers)
2. Galatians 3:26-28 (NRSV).	(biblical book, chapter, verses, translation if quoting)
3. Jerome, <i>Against Jovinian</i> 1.3.	(ancient author if known, title of work, section numbers)
4. Class lecture, Feb. 10.	(you can cite notes from discussions this way too)

Option 1 question: **Did early Christians have a binary gender system?**

For this option, write a **formal academic essay** that answers the question with a clear thesis statement and supports the statement with evidence from course texts. As your **audience**, picture a classmate outside our course; include very brief orientation to the texts as you seek to persuade your imagined reader. **Draw on as many texts as possible, discussing at least three in detail.**

Option 2 question: **Does the brief newspaper article below accurately represent the content, context, and historical interpretation of biblical passages?**

For this option, write a **formal, polished essay** accessible to a broad public audience (outside of academia). As your **audience**, picture a layperson who wonders if claims in news media accurately convey what the Bible says about same-gender sexuality. Respond by writing about a 2003 article from a Canadian newspaper, *The Guelph Mercury*: “Why Conservative Christians’ Obsession with Homosexuality Not Likely to Wane” (see file on Moodle)—the article is older but succinctly describes arguments about sexuality and the Bible that still circulate. **Give a clear answer to the question above and draw from at least five course sources (using both primary and secondary sources) to make your case and inform your reader.** Include what a reader of the newspaper article should know about this debated area, such as problematic assumptions expressed in the article, relevant issues in biblical texts/interpretation that add nuance, or historical information that can expand readers’ picture of ancient societies.
