Gay caucus denied use of display booth at Methodist confab

A group of self-proclaimed gay Juited Methodists plans to set up a lisplay and petition booth Tuesday at he annual session of the church's southwest Texas Conference despite being denied permission by Bishop J. Chess Lovern.

Whether the booth will result in some sort of confrontation Tuesday, the second day of the four-day conference, was unclear Monday.

"I don't know what is going to happen," said a conference spokesman who asked not to be identified.

The spokesman said the bishop was aware of the plans of the 12-member United Methodist Gay Caucus, but said Lovern did not wish to comment on the natter.

However, in correspondence from overn to the gay caucus which was

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leased by caucus member Troy lokes of Austin, Lovern turned down a accus request by writing:

"I do not wish to be unkind except to by to you that this conference has one through the trauma of the hestion several times before and it rould be of no service to you or the onference to open the matter in this panner again."

Lovern also said in the letter that ther groups had been denied groups to set up displays because ey do not have anything to do with the ork of the conference.

Gay status unclear

Stokes said of the caucus move: "The lain goal is to remind delegates and uests that the role and status of gay gople is not clear and sorely in need of a solution."

Stokes added that setting up the display against the bishop's wish is not meant to be disrespectful. "Rather, it is a statement of conscience."

He said petitions at the hooth will

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seek delegate signatures asking that the church remove anti-homosexual language from the Book of Discipline.

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About 1,000 people are attending the conference, which opened Monday afternoon at Travis Park United Methodist Church with a communion service.

The 367-member church conference represents nearly 109,000 Methodists in South and Southwest Texas.

Quadrennial conference

In business session Monday, the first ballot in the conference's selection of five clergy and five lay delegates to the quadrennial United Methodist General. Conference. April 15-25, 1980, in Indianapolis, was taken, but no decision was reached.

No one received enough votes to be selected, and a second ballot taken late Monday will have results tabulated by Tuesday.

The conference later will elect seven additional clergy and seven lay delegates who will join the general conference delegates for a South Central Jurisdiction Conference in July 1888, where new bishops — including a successful Lucron.
